The Bishops of England and Wales have decided to cease having public liturgies in our churches and chapels. Since the Church finds herself in this difficult situation because of the Coronavirus, the obligation for the faithful to attend Mass on a Sunday or Holy Day of Obligation is <u>removed</u> until further notice.

Celebration of Mass.

Priests continue to celebrate Mass in the church without the presence of the people, on a daily basis. The continuing celebration of Mass ensures that the people can join in <u>Spiritual Communion</u> with the priests of the Church.

Feast of SS Peter and Paul Sermon

 As a priest sometimes I am asked to write a reference for someone who has applied for a job. Normally of course, people come to see me and ask permission to use my name as a reference. Occasionally people do not ask. In my last parish I received a letter from an employee asking for a reference and I was forced to telephone to say that I could not recall the person who had put my name as their reference.

It is not easy to know someone really well. Now, if we were to ask even a close friend 'who do you say I am?', they might find it difficult to give an adequate answer to this question. If people are to know us well, we need to reveal ourselves to them, and self-revelation does not always come easy to us, even when we are in the presence of those who love us.

 The person and figure of Jesus Christ is a person who people struggle to get to know. This is made very clear to us in the Gospels. When Jesus turned to His disciples as we hear in today's Gospel and asked them

'Who do people say the son of man is?'

We hear a rather confused answer. Jesus was not John the Baptist, or Elijah, or Jeremiah, or one of the prophets even though He had something in common with all of them. But then Jesus asked His disciples the more pushing questions. 'But you, who do you say I am?' Peter's answer on behalf of all the others was much more satisfying.

You are the Christ, the Son of the living God.'

Here indeed was a real insight into Jesus' identity. But Jesus immediately declared that this insight was given to him by God and not simply from his own natural abilities.

It is the same for you and me. We can only know Jesus Christ more fully with the aid of God to help us; we need the light of God's Holy Spirit if we are to come to know God's son.

3. Today we are celebrating the feast of Saints Peter and Paul. We hear in the Gospels how Peter was singled out by Christ. He was to be the rock like foundation of Christ's Church and that is why Jesus changed his name from Simon to Peter which means rock (think of the word 'petrified', to turn and become like a rock). The Lord said 'He would give Peter the keys of the Kingdom of Heaven. This suggests authority, to bind and to loose. It seems to mean an authority to teach, to interpret the teaching of Christ to other members of the Church.

Do you remember Jesus criticising the Pharisees for locking people out of the Kingdom of Heaven by their teaching? In contrast, Peter's teaching should pave the way for all people to enter God's Kingdom. That is why the Church is called 'Catholic', meaning she is for everyone.

4. By contrast St Paul never met the earthly person of Jesus. By the time St Paul was confronted with the Lord, He had already risen. He became the great preacher and writer to the pagans. St Paul preached for the last time in the city of Rome where, like St Peter, he died for his faith in Christ, during the persecutions by the emperor Nero. How did Paul know Jesus so well? We get a clue in his letter to Timothy, today's second reading when he wrote 'The Lord stood by me and gave me power, so that through me the whole message might be proclaimed to all the pagans to hear ...'

In other words, St Paul relies not just on his own hard work and natural abilities but on that God's Holy Spirit was using him as an instrument to convey the person and teaching of Christ.

5. Like St Paul, we have not met Jesus in person but, like St Peter, Jesus confronts us with the question from the Gospel,

'But you, who do you say I am?'

To find the answer we come to Mass when we can (maybe not quite yet) to find an answer. If we are to know the Lord more fully, we need to share our innermost thoughts with Christ in our daily prayer. Trying to ask the Holy Spirit to inspire us to get to know how the Lord wants us to act especially with others maybe a keyway of being able to answer the question.

THE WORD

Year A • Psalter Week 1

Jesus has been going around curing sick people and performing miracles, with the result that he has become quite a celebrity. But he has also become a target, and those in authority are out to get him. They are trying to turn public opinion against him, and things are hotting up.

Jesus asks his disciples to be honest with him. He wants to know what people are saying about him. His friends are nervous and embarrassed. They fudge the issue and tell him only the good things.

Well, they begin, some say you are John the Baptist. Others say you are Elijah, while others think you're Jeremiah or one of the other great prophets.

But Jesus doesn't want flattery. He stops them in their tracks: "What about you?" he says, "Who do you say that I am?"

While the others stop to think about what they're going to say, Peter, impetuous as always, rushes forth with the winning answer. For him, Jesus is no mere prophet or returned figure from the past. He is the Messiah, God's own Son, the one whose coming the scriptures had foretold.

For the first time, it seems the disciples are beginning to recognise who Jesus really is. Then events take an unexpected turn, which no doubt leaves Peter dumbstruck and confused.

Jesus blesses Peter for his answer, and gives him authority in the community. Peter will be the unshakeable rock upon which Christ will build his Church, and will hold the keys of the kingdom of heaven.

Peter, and later Paul, knew that Jesus was their Lord and Saviour. They spent their lives after the resurrection and ascension of Jesus preaching that Good News, building up the early Church. Both shared a martyr's death. Both were instrumental in laying the foundations for the Church we have today.

That is why we honour them with today's feast. Like Peter and Paul, we know who Jesus is and we too are called to make him known as best we can.

DO

Though leaders of the Church, Peter and Paul were both very conscious of their faults and failings. They knew they were far from perfect. Think about your life. What are your failings? What do you need to do to be closer to God?

PRAY

Ask the Lord to help you always to know who he is and to witness to him to the best of your ability, following the example of Peter and Paul.

REFLECT

B ecause we are human, we make mistakes, we screw up, we disappoint ourselves and others. Whether it's on the sports field, or in the workplace, or in a relationship, we can let others down. We don't always show our potential.

And so we know how important it is to be given a second chance, another opportunity, to be able to start all over again. To be offered the possibility of redemption.

Peter and Paul both knew and experienced that. Both were weak characters, who made big mistakes. Peter denied Jesus three times; Paul actively persecuted members of the early Christian community. Both were most unlikely candidates to lead the Church, yet God chose both of them. God overlooked their weakness and past failures because God saw the extraordinary potential in the two of them.

In God's eyes, there are no lost causes, no hopeless cases. God sees the potential in everyone. God sees the potential in each one of us also, and as God did with Peter and Paul, invites us be our best selves.

LEARN

God sees the potential in everyone.

FIRST READING

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles.

King Herod started persecuting certain members of the Church. He beheaded James the brother of John, and when he saw that this pleased the Jews, he decided to arrest Peter as well. This was during the days of Unleavened Bread, and he put Peter in prison, assigning four squads of four soldiers each to guard him in turns. Herod meant to try Peter in public after the end of Passover week. All the time Peter was under guard the Church prayed to God for him unremittingly.

On the night before Herod was to try him, Peter was sleeping between two soldiers, fastened with double chains, while guards kept watch at the main entrance to the prison. Then suddenly the angel of the Lord stood there, and the cell was filled with light. He tapped Peter on the side and woke him. "Get up!" he said "Hurry!" - and the chains fell from his hands. The angel then said, "Put on your belt and sandals." After he had done this, the angel next said, "Wrap your cloak around you and follow me." Peter followed him, but had no idea that what the angel did was happening in reality; he thought he was seeing a vision. They passed through two guard posts one after the other, and reached the iron gate leading to the city. This opened of its own accord: they went through it and had walked the whole length of one street when suddenly the angel left him. It was only then that Peter came to himself. "Now I know it is all true," he said. "The Lord really did

send his angel and has saved me from Herod and from all that the Jewish people were so certain would happen to me. " The word of the Lord.
