



Refugees and asylum seekers in Pendle - Did you know?

- o There are over 400 refugees and asylum seekers living in the Pendle area
- They have arrived from 25 countries, all fleeing war or persecution. The greatest number are from Afghanistan, Syria, Eritrea, Iran, Iraq, Sudan, Kuwait, Ethiopia, and Ukraine.
- Our SVP Conference has regularly supported individuals and families over the last 6 years with money, clothes, household items etc.
- Asylum seekers receive £49.18 a week to buy food, clothes, toiletries, travel etc. Those claiming asylum are normally not allowed to work.
- We never forget that the Holy Family were refugees.
